## WHS Cell Phone Policy

Most teenagers like to think of themselves as expert multi-taskers. Students believe they can use their phones, snapchat with friends and study for tests all at the same time effectively. Unfortunately, the research is clear: multi-taking in school does not work. Even brief glances at a cell phone during class takes away attention and concentration. This loss of learning has been proven to have negative consequences on learning and grades for students.

With the start of the 23-24 school year, Willmar Senior High staff is emphasizing two parts of our cell phone policy. We have changed the language of the cell phone policy in the classroom to be more specific with our expectations and we have added specific expectations to keep cell phones out of our bathrooms.

### Cell Phone Expectations:

Cell phones cannot be physically on your person during instruction time. This means cell phones cannot be on student's desk, in student pockets, and/or within reach while in classrooms.

### Storing Cell Phones in Class:

Classroom Teachers will have one of the following places for students to put their phones while in class.

- A. Pocket Charts
- B. In Backpacks
- C. In a bin/basket

### Progressive Cell Phone Discipline:

If students do not adhere to the cell phone policy in class the following steps will be taken.

**1st Offense** - Teacher gives a verbal reminder for the student to put the phone away in compliance with the Cell Phone Expectations.

**2nd Offense** - Teacher holds onto the phone until the end of the block. Teachers will contact the parent/guardian of the student.

**3rd Offense** - Teacher holds the phone till the end of the school day. Student will pick up the phone at the end of the school day from their Assistant Principal. The Assistant Principal will contact the student's parent/guardian.

**4th Offense** - Cell phone is brought to the office for the remainder of the school day and Assistant Principal notifies parent/guardian. Parent must come in after school for a meeting and to pick up their student's phone.

### Substitute Teachers Phone Policy:

Students will get one warning to put their phone away. If correction isn't made, the student will be sent to the office and a meeting with an Assistant Principal will take place.

### No Cell Phones in Bathrooms:

Cell phones cannot be out and visible in restrooms at any time (INCLUDING PASSING TIME). Staff will bring students to the office to meet with an Assistant Principal if their phone is out while they are in a bathroom



## Zero Hour at the High School

As you are aware, Willmar Senior High School starts late on Wednesdays with 1st block starting at 9:00 AM instead of our regular 8:00 AM starting time. We call this time Zero Hour and serves two primary and separate purposes:

First, it will allow staff to have much needed regular staff development time from 7:15am until 8:50am. Part of what we will do each Wednesday morning will be to prepare for our “Ramp Up” curriculum to be delivered to the students at 1:05 PM on Wednesday. The remaining staff development time on Wednesday mornings is devoted for teachers working together to advance their teaching and to increase student engagement and learning.

Second, our Wednesday morning Zero Hour is designed to support students learning and give them the opportunities for enrichment. Room 115J will be dedicated to students who need help in Science. Room 115H is available for students who need help in Math. Other school tutors will be assisting students in Room 115E for other subjects. In addition to tutor-led homework help, students also have opportunities to study in groups or catch-up on tests or quizzes. Room 105B is the dedicated Test/Quiz Make-Up room.

Zero Hour is an opportunity for students who have busy schedules before or after school, or for those who ride the bus and cannot make it to school outside of the school day, to catch up on missing tests or do a re-take if the teacher allows. We are encouraging our students, especially those with college level classes, to use study group learning strategies and start study groups in the library or other areas of the school. Peer-led group study has been proven to be a very helpful tool for students and with our increase in college level classes at WHS, we are excited to be able to offer dedicated time for students willing to put in the work.

Besides the academic opportunities, students who are on track in their classes are still welcome to be in our building on Wednesday mornings. Our cafeteria will be open from 7:30 until 8:45 serving breakfast. We will have staff in the gyms for students who would like to get exercise or play basketball, volleyball or soccer. Also, the music pod will be open and available for music students to come in and practice individual lessons.

Although the Zero Hour opportunities are optional for some students, Zero Hour will be mandatory for others. Any student who has an NC in a current class or on their transcript (NC's are generated by unexcused absences or having excessive tardies) will be required to attend our detention room in the IMC computer lab until their time is made up. Those students will not be allowed anywhere else in the building if they are here between 7:50 and 8:50 on Wednesday mornings.

Students who are falling behind in class or are not completing their homework will also be “ticketed” to one of our study rooms. The ticket process begins with the teacher having a conversation with the student. The teacher will lay out the expectations for the student of what is expected in class with a timeline for those expectations to be completed. If the expectations are not met, a contact home will be made. The parent and student will be informed that the student has been “ticketed” for Zero Hour and attendance from 7:50 until 8:50 on Wednesday is mandatory for that student until they are meeting expectations. That student must attend the study room they have been ticketed to or they will be marked unexcused absent from Zero Hour. Once the ticketing process has been done once in a class and the parents and student know the expectation, the teacher can re-issue a ticket if the student falls behind again by simply emailing the student by Monday night for the Wednesday morning Zero Hour. Not doing what is academically expected is not an option at Willmar Senior High!

## Ramp Up Notes

### 9th Grade: How To Do High School

Students have been learning about the different resources available at the high school to help them be successful and meet their needs. Upcoming lessons will provide opportunities for students to learn skills related to organization, studying, decision making and test taking to help them be successful in their classes. High school graduation requirements will also be reviewed so students know what is expected each year for required credits.

### 10th Grade: Career Investigation

Students have been doing activities to help better understand themselves and how their personality fits with different career opportunities. They have also performed a reality check to learn about possible careers that match the life they hope to have in the future. Students will continue to research and investigate possible careers and what they entail. Students will also have an opportunity later in the year to meet with local professionals related to their career interests.

### 11th Grade: Career Pathways

Students have been reviewing and selecting careers they are interested in pursuing. Later in the year, students will have an opportunity to meet with local professionals related to their career interests. Upcoming lessons will focus on the different Career Pathways available to gain education and/or credentials for a career of their choice. These pathways will include 4-year colleges, community colleges and trade schools, and the military. Students will be researching what these different pathways require and have to offer so they can make a decision that best fits their plan.

### 12th Grade: Life After High School

Students have discussed and chosen a possible career pathway for their life after high school. These pathways included 4-year colleges, 2-year colleges, on the job training/ trade schools or the military. Some upcoming lessons will provide opportunities for students to learn about applying within their chosen pathway, financial aid & scholarships, budgeting, interviewing skills, and other topics related to graduation and life after high school.



## From the Health Office

The school health office is a first aid station for students who become ill or are injured during school hours. If a student is too ill to attend classes or has sustained a serious injury, a parent/ guardian will be notified to arrange for the student to go home. The school does not transport ill or injured students and an ambulance will be called only in extreme situations. To avoid disciplinary actions, authorization from a parent/guardian is required prior to a student leaving the building.

During the school year, please notify the school health office about infectious diseases, major illness, or injuries concerning your child.

Hearing and Vision: Screenings will only be done at the request of a teacher or parent during the school year.

Medications: If your child requires medications to be administered at school, a physician's order and written parent/guardian's permission must be provided along with the medication in a properly labeled container. A new medication physician's order/written consent must be provided every year. NO medications will be provided by the school. If a student requires an "as needed" medication, such as acetaminophen or ibuprofen they must have their own supply. These can be stored in the health office. The school is not responsible for administration of these medications.
